PRESENTATION SUMMARY

NANAIMO PUBLIC HEARING DATED 27 MAY 2004 AT COAST BASTION HOTEL

DESCRIPTION OF PRESENTATION

A proposal for multi-member district proportional representation.

KEY THEMES

Stephen McCarthy explained that he is a Grade 11 student who has recently completed a school project on electoral reform. He commented on earlier presentations made by Robert Baker and Julian West and argued that Mr Baker's modification of FPP to include a 'no' vote could be used to vote out major parties, giving minor parties a greater differential between 'yes' and 'no' votes and therefore resulting in a greater number of minor party candidates being elected. Mr McCarthy challenged the conventional definition of local representation as based on geography, and argued that while regional and local representation are important, many voters feel that they are not represented locally if the party they voted for does not win in their riding. He proposed a proportional representation system using multi-member districts. Mr McCarthy told the hearing that, while his original proposal had recommended districts with a magnitude of ten, that he was also interested in Julian West's earlier recommendation in favour of multi-member districts with a magnitude of between three and five. MLAs would be elected according to the proportion of the vote received by each party in that region. Mr McCarthy argued that multi-member ridings would provide both regional representation and proportional representation, and said that he was open to the use of circuits within these ridings, as suggested by Dr West. He suggested that this system could also be used for federal elections, to ensure that the MLAs elected in each province reflected the proportion of votes won by each party across the province.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Stephen McCarthy recommended the introduction of a PR electoral system in British Columbia with multi-member regional districts.
