DESCRIPTION OF PRESENTATION

I view PR as a key first step towards the greater democratization of our society.

KEY THEMES

Douglas Gook explained that PR is a major policy plank in the Green Party platform and the Greens have also been active in a referendum drive for PR. He views PR as a key first step towards the greater democratization of our society. Mr Gook recognized that the Assembly's mandate restricted it to considering only models of representative democracy, but suggested that the community consensual democracy model, as used at times in Denmark, Argentina, Libya and Cuba had a lot to offer BC. He emphasized the importance of citizen-oriented democratic processes.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Douglas Gook recommended the introduction of proportional representation in British Columbia.

QUESTIONS, ANSWERS AND COMMENTS FROM THE PANEL

One member of the panel sought clarification on elements of the presentation.

Q	How would this community consensual model translate on a provincial level?
A	In Libya, the power is right back on the community level. You have a direct connection with the members, and then this level puts forward ideas to other levels of representation in the nation. But most of the power is concentrated in direct representation at the community level.

Following this presentation a member of the audience had a question.

Q	I think you made a very good point at the role of corporate powers
	in BC government. But I think a better point you made is to look
	to countries that aren't labeled as democracies for models of

	government. I think it's important that Western societies, such as in BC, should look at older societies in the Middle East and in Asia. They cherish the local level and I think it's important that we look at that.
A	We also have phenomenal traditions of sustainable societies in our own back yard with valuable models of governance. There is much to learn from the First Nations of this land.
