

A Proposal for Mixed Regional Proportional Representation

Summary

This document proposes a method of proportional representation, which

1. Assigns a number of seats to each party based on that party's overall popular vote;
2. Assigns seats to individual candidates according to their party ranking;
3. Allows each party a minimum of one seat, optionally allocated to candidate(s) of their choice;
4. Retains a considerable amount of regional representation.

1. Introduction

Much has been written and discussed about the drawbacks of our regional representation electoral system. The major drawback is that this system strongly favours the leading party, taking seats not only from the opposition, but tends to totally exclude the smallest parties. Yet most Canadians feel strongly about regional representation and are not willing to surrender this feature of our current electoral system.

A fairly minor modification in our electoral system can accomplish this. Although the implications are far-reaching, I call it a minor modification, because it does not change the riding-system of voting, or the way an election is run, or even how a voter fills in his or her ballot. This method only requires a few fairly simple calculations using the final ballot figures to determine the seat allocation. This method retains a strong flavour of the existing regional representation that is fundamental to our parliamentary system, while at the same time providing a fairer representation of the parties involved in the resulting parliament. For the purpose of this discussion I will call this method "Mixed Regional Proportional Representation" (MRPR).

2. Applying MRPR to previous elections

To demonstrate that this method does not require a change in our riding system of voting, let us consider the 2000 federal as well as the 2001 British Columbia provincial elections, both of which resulted in a glaring imbalance in the respective legislatures. In the 2000 federal election, the Liberal Party garnered 40.8% of the national popular vote, yet acquired 57% of the 301 seats in Parliament. The imbalance was even more striking in the 2001 BC election, where the Liberal party received 57.6% of the popular vote, yet they occupy 97.4% of the 79 seats in the Legislature (table 1).

Applying the MRPR method to the results¹ of these two elections, we will see a dramatic shift in the seat allocation. Not only will the opposition parties be much better represented, even the so-called “fringe” parties will acquire several seats in the respective Legislatures (table 1).

The remainder of this document will focus on the election results from the 2001 British Columbia election for demonstration purposes. A detailed compilation of the 2000 Federal election is attached as an appendix (Appendix C).

3. Compilation of the 2001 BC Election Results

To accomplish our lofty goal of Mixed Regional Proportional Representation, we take a three-step approach:

1. Allocate a proportional number of seats to each party;
2. Assign candidates to seats through candidate ranking;
3. Calculate each party’s allowance to appoint seats.

STEP 1. Allocate a proportional number of seats to each Party

This is the easy and logical part. Determine the number of Legislative Seats assigned to each party according to the total provincial vote for each party (Table 2). Normal rounding² can initially be used, but depending on the numbers, this may result in over- or under-allocation of seats. In that case, proceed as follows:

1. Determine the initial seat numbers (column C) by multiplying each party's popular vote (B) by the total number of seats available (79);
2. in col. D, round down all numbers from col. C; determine the number of unallocated seats (four, in this case);
3. Take the decimal portion of numbers in C and rank them (col. E);
4. In col. F, assign the unallocated seats from 2. and allocate them according to ranking in E;
5. Determine final seat count (G) by adding D and F.

No rocket science so far. But now comes the tricky part. Who gets to sit in these seats?

STEP 2. Assign candidates to seats

Each candidate is ranked within his/her party according to his/her "riding percent vote" (Appendix A). Ranking is based on the riding percent vote, rather than the number of votes, in order to eliminate differences in the size of electoral ridings. The candidate with the highest percent vote in his/her

riding is ranked number 1, the next highest number 2, and so on. The seats available to each party are assigned to the candidates, based on this ranking. Appendix A shows a partial listing of candidates, listing the candidates that were actually elected in 2001, as well as those candidates that would be elected using the MRPR method.

STEP 3. Calculate each party's allowance for making appointments

A problem that occurs from time to time is that “star” candidates, or at times even party leaders, do not receive sufficient votes to be declared elected. Even though the party may consider such a candidate a valuable member of the team, the electorate may not always share that view. There is however that “grey area” where a candidate may have lost by a small margin. If in those cases a minor modification to the electoral system can prevent the necessity of expensive by-elections or the loss of truly valuable politicians³, then let's make that change by eliminating the grey area.

The appointed-seat rule is as follows:

Each party that has been allocated one or more seats in step 1, has the option to use one of these allocated seats, or 10% of their total number of seats (normal rounding), whichever is greater, to appoint one of their own, provided:

- That the appointed individual is a legitimate party member, as well as a candidate running for the party in the current election, and that the appointed candidate either
 - acquired a minimum of 35% of his/her riding vote, or
 - is the leader of the party, democratically elected prior to the election, and received a minimum of 20% of his/her riding's popular vote in this current election.

The number of appointed seats calculated is a maximum, and their use is optional. A party may decide not to use any or all of these seats for appointments. All appointment decisions must be made within 48 hours after the election and these decisions are final.

The results of applying this calculation of appointed seats to this election are shown in table 3. In the case of the Liberal party, for example, their total number of seats is 46, if they appoint the first five seats allocated in step 2, then the 41 highest ranking candidates get the remainder of the seats. The lowest ranking candidates will in that case have to make room for these appointments.

4. Discussion

Applying this method of Mixed Regional Proportional Representation to the 2001 BC election results, the Liberal Party will get 46 seats instead of 77, the NDP gets 17 seats instead of 2, the Green Party gets 10 seats instead of nothing, and even the Marijuana Party and the Unity Party get three voices each in the Provincial Legislature.

As for the degree of regional representation in this new and improved MRPR Legislature, we see that there are 12 ridings (15%) that will end up not being represented in the legislature, and an equal number of 12 ridings will have two representatives each (Appendix B). It will be rare, though not inconceivable, that a riding may end up with more than 2 representatives after an election.

Is this disadvantage of having ridings without any representation significant? Maybe not. Even under the current system, many ridings don't really benefit from their duly elected representative, not only if their MLA is not part of the majority, but also if their MLA is simply "not effective". But, to remedy this problem, a method can be devised to assign an unrepresented riding to an MLA, possibly one of the MLA's in a dual-MLA riding can be assigned this task. Or alternatively, a local representative may be appointed (possibly the "bumped" candidate?) to act as intermediary between constituents and Legislature.

Looking at the riding percent vote for some of the newly elected MLA's (Appendix A) gives an odd picture, particularly looking at the members elected for the smaller parties (MP and UP). The latter may be elected with as little as 6% of riding votes, whereas a candidate from a larger party may be "bumped" even though he received more than 50% of the popular vote. To make matters worse, these two candidates may even be from the same riding! Many people would be happier not to see these smaller fringe-parties in the Legislature, but to be fair, if they gather a certain percentage of the provincial popular vote, they should be entitled to that percentage of the seats. The Green Party received one out of every eight votes provincially (12.4%), yet under the present system ends up without even a single seat.

Independent candidates are less likely to be successful. Even if an independent candidate wins in his/her riding, the resulting provincial popular vote will likely be too low to result in a seat. A possible remedy could be to allow a winning independent candidate to take his seat before any of the MRPR calculations are applied. In other words, if one independent wins in his/her riding, the seat calculation will be on 78 instead of 79 seats.

5. Conclusion

As demonstrated, the Mixed Regional Proportional Representation method is a fully functional proportional method, which retains most of the regional representation of our current electoral system. A major advantage of this method is that we will retain the simplicity of voting for a single candidate. No complexity is added to the ballot, as opposed to some other electoral systems being considered. The option to appoint seats allows parties to introduce “star” candidates into the Legislature that would otherwise be left out. Again, this may seem undemocratic, but if it brings in more talent or saves the taxpayer money otherwise spent on by-elections, then we will all benefit in the end.

As with any system, there are disadvantages. I’ll leave it to the critics to tear this proposal apart, but I can identify three disadvantages right now.

- Equal regional representation is somewhat affected (a loss of 15% in the BC election).
- Independent candidates are less likely to be successful.
- Greater risk of the government not receiving a majority.

With this method, the old adage finally becomes true: “Every vote counts”. Should this method be adopted, I believe that not only will more people turn up at the voting booth, but also people will really vote with their heart and will vote for the candidate they believe in. Smaller parties such as the Green Party will very likely gather more support than they ever did in the past.

I challenge the government of British Columbia, and while I’m at it, the Federal Government and any other parliamentary jurisdiction in Canada, to implement this very simple modification of the seat allocation procedure following an election.

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Note: earlier versions of this document (2001/05/17 and 2004/06/03) were based on data obtained from CBC.ca web page, immediately after the election. Some discrepancies crept in as the CBC data were apparently incomplete. No harm done, as the data was for demonstration purposes only. As mentioned earlier, this version utilizes data obtained from the Elections BC website.
