PRESENTATION SUMMARY

DESCRIPTION OF PRESENTATION

A statistical analysis of the difference in votes and the popular vote percentage to the number of seats and percentage of seats attained in the Legislature for provincial general elections - 1871 to 2001.

KEY THEMES

Mr. MacDonell presented an analysis of the difference between votes cast and seats won between 1871 and 2001. The presenter examined how right of centre, left of centre, and centralist political groups have fared under FPTP. Mr. MacDonell argued that in the late 1890s, votes cast were largely proportionate to seats won. This trend was displaced by 1909, however, with large disparities (both negative and positive) emerging between votes cast and seats won. A period of proportionate results again emerged in the late 1970's and early 1980's, however this was replaced by severely distorted results in the provincial election of 2001. Mr. MacDonell argued that this kind of representation is not fair and equitable for half a million people in the province of British Columbia.

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Q	I understand that you are keen on some form of proportionality, what is your preference?
