DESCRIPTION OF PRESENTATION

Concerns with the current system and characteristics that a new system should have, from an NGO perspective.

KEY THEMES

On behalf of West Coast Environmental Law, I support MMP. It is important to consider this non government organization's (NGO) perspective because of its contribution to democracy. NGOs often provide platforms to reflect citizens' views, with a unique perspective on societal needs. It is also important to keep in mind that NGOs are supported by citizens in a number of ways. The act of supporting an NGO is an appreciation of the work that they provide. The input is publicly driven, with no special interest agenda.

The primary problem with the first-past-the-post (FPTP) system is that it has a tendency to give rise to majority governments that do not reflect the popular vote. While it is often argued that majority governments allow for solid decision-making power and stability they are also disadvantageous for the following reasons:

- 1) Majority governments are able to forward a political agenda that does not reflect the interests and concerns of a majority of voters.
- 2) In BC, this has led to polarized politics in which parties represent different ends of the political spectrum. There are inherent problems with the system itself.

The second NGO concern with the current system is that representation is now solely based on geographic regions. Parties that have substantial but diffuse support due to their particular position on certain issues or overall philosophical approach are often unable to win seats. As a result, these parties and the electorate that supports them are inadequately represented, and some critical issues facing British Columbians may never even be given voice in the political system.

In addition, our current system effectively allows for a maximum of two parties to meaningfully participate in the legislature. Some groups with diffuse support, knowing they have little chance of ever being able to participate in the current system do not form parties at all. West Coast advocates a Mixed Member proportional system (MMP). Pure proportional representation does not retain local representation, while single transferable vote (STV) would require an undesirable increase in the size of electoral districts and Mixed Member Majority (MMM) would favour large parties. MMP gives rise to governments that more fairly represent the interests and views of citizens, and as such, is likely to facilitate NGO participation in governance.

RECOMMENDATIONS
