DESCRIPTION OF PRESENTATION

Votes-to-seats: Lesson from other jurisdictions such as Israel, Germany, Australia and New Zealand.

KEY THEMES

David Godfrey argued that the under-representation of women in the legislature is a social ill that cannot be resolved by an alternative electoral system. He also opposed the creation of First Nations seats in the legislature because he felt that the creation of additional special ethnic seats undermined the premise that all British Columbians are equal. He outlined his core criteria for a fair electoral system: that all seats are equal, that all persons elected to seats are equal, that the method for determining who is elected and why should be clear to voter, and that the ballot should be obvious to use. Mr Godfrey evaluated a list proportional representation (list-PR) system, a mixed member proportional (MMP) system and the Alternative Vote (AV) system against these criteria and concluded that, while all three systems were fairly simple to understand and to use, the AV system provided more guarantees that all seats and persons elected to those seats are equal because it retains the single-member ridings used today. He expressed concern that a list-PR system, and an MMP system with a party list component would involve the parties ranking candidates, which would create inequalities within the parties, and could result in regions not being represented equally if list MLAs were predominantly from the Lower Mainland.

RECOMMENDATIONS

David Godfrey recommended the introduction of the Alternative Vote electoral system in BC.
