PRESENTATION SUMMARY

NEW WESTMINSTER PUBLIC HEARING DATED 6 MAY 2004 AT THE INN AT WESTMINSTER QUAY

DESCRIPTION OF PRESENTATION

Environmental concerns of the electorate are not being properly represented.

KEY THEMES

The presenter felt that majority views of the province are not being heard in government. Mr. Lane used the example of the environment to exemplify this point. The presenter felt that the current electoral system did not provide accountability of MLA's to voters and that citizen apathy was fostered by an unresponsive government.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The presenter recommended a change to a MMP system in order to protect local representation while enhancing the representativeness of the legislature. Mr. Lane also proposed the introduction of more institutions of deliberative democracy; the introduction of measures to ensure that elections are fair; the reform of voting procedures within the legislature requiring a larger number of members (perhaps a two-thirds majority) to enable the passage of legislation; and finally the implementation of an electoral audit commission on the fulfillment of policy platforms.
