DESCRIPTION OF PRESENTATION

The presenter stated that PR and the inclusion of minority parties would not be a bad thing. The problem would be how to avoid having a myriad of parties like in Italy and Israel.

KEY THEMES

The structure of our voting system tends to emphasize the conflicts in the province. A PR system with minority parties would not be a bad thing, but how would we avoid problems like in Italy and Israel where there are many parties?

RECOMMENDATIONS

Adopt a PR system.
